This circuit of defences was established in the first century AD and readopted during the Late Saxon and Medieval period. Parts of the Medieval City Wall survive above and below ground along North Walls, parts of which are protected as a Scheduled Monument (SM No. 247). There is the potential for Roman, Saxon and Medieval deposits associated with these defences, such as ditches, to survive, particularly along the Southern extent of this land holding. Remains of the city wall have been identified at shallow depth in close proximity to the site. To the north of the defences the site may contain important palaeoenviromental deposits as well as evidence of water management systems dating from the Late Saxon period onwards. To the west of land pacrel, lie the Roman and Late Saxon/ medieval suburbs.	Red / Amber	This parcel lies within an area of significant archaeological potential. The site contains part of the alignment of the city defences of Winchester, and there is the potential for further features associated with this monument to survive as sub-surface deposits across this land holding.
