## **Community Action Day!**

On the 12th February 2019 the City Council's Neighbourhood Services Team and Housing Policy & Projects joined forces with volunteers from Winchester Hub & Winchester Student Union to help with the renovation, refurbishment & redecoration of Somers Close recreation ground and the surrounding area. ## Advice on Domestic CCTV

An individual has the right to protect their property and this can be done by using a CCTV system where it is necessary, such as a security measure.

However, there have been a rising number of complaints to both the Police and the Surveillance Camera Commissioner (SCC) from neighbours and other members of the

public who believe that cameras are being used to spy on them and their families.

The SCC recommends that users of CCTV systems should operate them in a responsible way to respect the privacy of others and have recently published the <u>SCC Guidance on the use of domestic CCTV.</u>

It contains an important reminder that if your camera captures images outside the boundaries of your household, then the General Data Protection Legislation (GDPR) and Data Protection Act will apply to you, and you will need to ensure your use of CCTV complies with these laws.

# Making Every Adult Matter The MEAM (Making Every Adult Matter) Approach

The Community Safety Partnership is committed to tackling street related antisocial behaviour that includes drunkenness and begging. Using the tools and powers available the Community Safety Team will work with other agencies to try and reduce the reported incidents.

In order to take a balanced approach the Community Safety Partnership and City Council officers work alongside support services to help those who are homeless or rough sleeping.

Winchester City Council is therefore pleased to confirm that we have joined the The National MEAM Network.

### So what is MEAM?

The MEAM Approach aims to help local areas design and deliver better coordinated services for people experiencing multiple disadvantage. It's currently being used by partnerships of statutory and voluntary agencies in 27 local areas across England.

In these places, local authorities, statutory agencies and the voluntary sector are working together to transform the lives of people experiencing a combination of homelessness, substance misuse, contact with the criminal justice system and mental health problems.

The local areas use a framework called the <u>MEAM Approach</u> to help shape their work and receive support and advice from MEAM coalition staff based across the country. The partnerships all share an ambition to work alongside people with lived experience of multiple needs to change systems for the better

## Handyperson Scheme

The Handyperson Service offers small repairs and adaptations at a subsidised rate to those who qualify in the Winchester District. In order to qualify to use the service clients need to be either over 60 years of age/ living with a disability or both. The scheme is open to Winchester City Council tenants/Housing Association tenants/ Homeowners and Private tenants. The hourly rate charged is :

- £9.60 + VAT for clients in receipt of means tested benefits
- £18.00 + VAT for other clients
