We work in strategic partnership with Winchester City Council to deliver shared goals including: • Providing a high quality cultural offer to a growing, increasingly diverse population, ensuring we can meet the cultural and access needs of residents as new housing is developed locally and across the district • Supporting the cohesion of local communities by sharing stories and experiences and combating isolation by bringing people together • Contributing to a desirable and vibrant place which people want to visit, and work and live in, helping drive business growth • Championing the health and happiness of local residents by providing creative, stimulating, 'feel good' and physical activities to support active communities and mental good health and well being • Offering employment and volunteering opportunities • Partnering with others in the City to offer strategic, imaginative and entrepreneurial solutions to shared challenges and aspirations. We present over 300 performances a year at Theatre Royal Winchester and many more as part of Hat Fair and associated activities, attracting a total of well over 150,000 people a year. We offer a holistic approach supporting clients with a range of complex/multiple advice issues. 2022 marks our 70th anniversary. Nature: We give free advice on a range of issues. The highest demand areas are: money and finance, followed by housing, relationships and employment. During the pandemic we primarily gave advice via phone or email, but also continued to offer face-to-face services for vulnerable people throughout this time. Demand for face-to-face services has been growing steadily as Covid restrictions have eased. Profile: In 2020-21 we helped 7321 people with 17,910 issues. We generated £1.78m in income gains for clients. The proportion of clients that have a disability and/or long-term health condition have increased recently to 50% (from around 40% pre-pandemic), and 20% of our clients are aged 65 and over. We help a high proportion (in relative terms, 12 %) of people from Black or Minority Ethnic backgrounds. We are champions of equality. We undertake regular fact-based community profiling to assess the demographics of the locality to ensure that we understand the need as best we can. Reach: We deliver services to clients from all over the district. In 2020-21, this was proportionately 43% from 'Town' (city) and 57% clients were from 'Wider District' (elsewhere). We deliver face-to-face services in Winchester City Centre and Bishops Waltham, and on a 'project' basis, services (subject to funding) in Alresford, Wickham, Denmead, HM Prison Winchester, Melbury Lodge (mental-health unit), and Royal Surrey County Hospital.
