Domestic Abuse & Violence¹

Overall Aims

- Deliver against government statutory duty to include Domestic Homicide Review (DHR) Section 9 of the Domestic Violence Crime and Victims Act 004, Domestic Abuse Act 2021, ASB Action Plan, Prevent/Protect Duty, Serious Violence, Crime & Disorder Act.
- Increase the implementation of policing powers: Clare's Law, Domestic Violence Protection Notice (DVPN) and Domestic Violence Protection Orders (DVPO), Stalking Protection Orders (SPO) and Non-Molestation Orders
- Develop education and awareness raising campaigns that promotes both national and local support to victims of domestic violence and abuse
- Increase support to victims of domestic abuse that assists enforcement outcomes
- Provide intervention and referral support to those who may be at risk of domestic homicide

Overall Objectives

- Learning outcomes identified and actioned because of domestic homicide review
- Education and awareness campaigns rolled out i.e., perpetrator programmes, women's support services, Clare's Law, Adolescent to Parent support, Safer Streets, White Ribbon etc.
- Increased use of pre prosecution policing powers i.e., DVPN, DVPO, SPO, Non-Molestation Orders, restraining orders etc.
- Reduction in the number of repeat victims and offenders evidenced because of increased referral, education, and targeted enforcement action
- Successful funding applications achieved via the Office of Police & Crime Commissioner (OPCC)/Home Office for commissioned funding
- Improve access to services using a menu of options: QR codes, apps, social media, leaflets.

¹ Domestic Abuse & Violence to include any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive, threatening behaviour, violence, or abuse between those aged sixteen or over who are, or have been, intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality. The abuse can encompass, but is not limited to psychological, physical, sexual, financial, emotional.

Overall Aims

- Deliver against government statutory duty to include Domestic Homicide Review (DHR), Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, ASB Action Plan, Housing Regulation Act 2023, Criminal Justice Bill, Prevent/Protect Duty, Serious Violence, Crime & Disorder Act.
- To reduce the number of Community Protection Notices (CPN)/Criminal Behaviour Orders (CBO) breach's
- To improve satisfaction levels in relation to partnership intervention for crime & disorder
- Deliver Government guidance in relation to the ASB Action Plan, and statutory duties i.e., ASB tools and powers.
- Undertake specific intervention/enforcement for those coming to attention to partners via multi-agency meetings i.e., ASB Panel, task and finish groups, schools partnership, housing pathways
- Provide Community Engagement opportunities
- Increase engagement with young people through targeted intervention
- Improve access to health & wellbeing services i.e., Clinical Commissioning Services, GPs, detox services
- Put in place target hardening aimed at reducing the opportunity for criminal damage

Overall Objectives

- Develop opportunities around continuous feedback/satisfaction surveys using digital and other forms of engagement
- Ensure positive sanctions are included as standard in all Community Protection Notices/Community Protection Orders are issued
- Ensure that multi-agency meetings (ASB/task & finish Groups) for tackling issues related to ASB/street drinking/begging are in place to manage persistent offenders
- Ensure the Government's ASB Action Plan is embedded in relation to local practice when addressing ASB
- Continue to promote referral pathways for those seeking health & wellbeing services via partner agencies
- Undertake high vis operations, increased outreach, environmental improvements that design out crime.
