WINCHESTER STREET REACH	£9,380	£6,847	Our primary objective is to empower disadvantaged and vulnerable young people aged 11-19 (up to 25 with additional needs) to recognise and achieve their full potential. Our core work is detached youth work in Weeke, Harestock, Winnall and Stanmore. We work with young people who out in the local community in areas such as shop fronts, parks and housing estates. Our youth workers meet the young people in their own territory, building trusting relationships over time in order to offer targeted support and guidance where it is most needed. Street Reach work with young people to ensure they are included within their community, especially those young people out of education or NEET, or who may be vulnerable to exploitation. Our team can act as a trusted adult to ensure that these individuals are kept safe. We deliver a range of activities and interventions to young people using creative approaches. Our work helps to redress socioeconomic disadvantage as well as reducing isolation amongst young people. We raise awareness and provide support around mental health, and our projects help raise selfesteem, build social skills, improve community relations and support physical health. We also help young people with employment and training opportunities. We also deliver a range of popular centre-based projects including a weekly drop-in Football project, a targeted workshops series, an in-school project for young people experiencing isolation, and a much-needed rural youth club in Micheldever. They range in age from 18-80 years old. We have 101 active members - those who've engaged with us in the last year. In addition, we have 52 inactive members - individuals who do not need our ongoing support, but will contact us in times of difficulty (eg if support needs are unmet; moving house, bereavement, redundancy). Since March 2020 we welcomed 23 new members (a 26% increase to our active membership). Prior to the pandemic, Winchester Go LD supported 27% of our active members in employed or voluntary work. The Hampshire Children's Trust Threshold Chart that shows young carers are vulnerable, complex and have acute needs, noting that this disadvantaged group of children and young people need barriers removed so they can access, participate and achieve. The tasks undertaken by children and young people vary according to the nature of the illness or disability, as well as the level and frequency of need for care and the structure of the family unit. Home Start Hampshire	£9,000	£6,570	We support families in the Winchester South Districts as shown below. Through a core team of paid staff and an extensive team of volunteers we provide one-to-one support to families with young children who face overwhelming challenges and are struggling to cope living. Families are referred to us most commonly by health or social care professionals (or can self-refer). Our delivery service in Wickham is based around our Family Co-ordinator and 28 volunteers. We provide practical and emotional support for families through one to one visits to family homes by a trained family support volunteer. The Meon Valley is a vast area of little villages and social isolation is a key issue. Our volunteers provide vital support to families during difficult times to ensure that parents are supported and that every child has the best start in life. Our dedicated team of volunteers visit homes on a weekly basis and provide other support such as phone / digital. Our family co-ordinator supervises our volunteers, is responsible for safeguarding work, links to referal agencies and training. She also provides vital family support. Winchester Youth Counselling	£8,500	£7,480	We provide counselling and other therapies to young people aged between 11-25. All of our clients are struggling with their mental health in various ways and for a range of reasons. The most common themes amongst clients are issues related to anxiety, depression, self harm, bullying, domestic violence, gender and sexuality, sexual assault, and other traumas. Our service is free, and we endeavour to provide an open ended service as opposed to a predetermined number of sessions, in order to ensure a meaningful life change for the young person. We provide 1:1 counselling, Nature therapy, walk and talk therapy, Destress relax and chill (this is for anxiety), group therapy and parent consultations. All of our counsellors and therapists are registered with the BACP (British Association of Counsellors and Psychotherapists) or the UKCP (UK Council for Psychotherapy). Any young person aged 11-25 and living in the district of Winchester can access our service. Young people can self refer, or be referred by parents or a professional such as a social worker or a GP. We also provide counselling from three Winchester district Schools (Kings, Swanmore and Perins) to allow flexibility in appointments and see young people in school were possible. We also have our counselling rooms at 68 St Georges Street Winchester, and deliver Nature Therapy and walk and talk at Barton Meadows and Winnall Moors. Supported families have at least one child under five and struggle with one or more of the following: isolation, low self-esteem, mental health, serious illness of parent/s and or child/ren, dependence entirely on benefits, victim of domestic abuse, CiN, CP plans in place, Early HelpHub and Health Visitor referrals, as well as single mothers and multiple children under five. We provide the following core services: weekly home-visits of 2-3 hours by trained Volunteers, supervised by paid staff for approximately 50 families a year; weekly Family Groups, which support over 30 families per year allowing parents to play with their children, share problems and solutions with peers and seek advice from Home-Start staff and Volunteers. Parents can attend parenting courses and our goal is to stabilise the family and help them become better able to cope with the challenges and responsibilities of their parenting. In addition, we provide: school-readiness support for children who are likely to struggle with their Reception year, either through home-visiting services, or for those most in need, a structured four-month programme; training parents in parenting, budgeting, Universal Credit, dealing with behavioural and other specific issues; healthy eating and fitness initiatives, helping parents to buy good ingredients, cook meals, make use of outdoor spaces and facilities; taking families to health professionals appointments; limited counselling services for parents who have experienced trauma; events and outings for all families; and the distribution of surplus food.
