# Finding Work in the UK

The following guide provides links and tips on how to find work in the Winchester district.

Finding work can help you move on from a sponsor and secure private rented accommodation. It can help you live a financially independent life here in the UK.

# Help with finding work

There are organisations that can help and support you to find work.

Some organisations run programmes to help you write your CV, practice for interviews, get work placements and training opportunities which can lead to guaranteed interviews with employers.

You don't have to be an English speaker for them to help you. Below, we list some organisations that can help.

*If you are unemployed and on Universal Credit, always check with your Work Coach that they are happy for you to attend any courses or programmes that help you find work, before you sign up.*

## Employment support from local organisations

Start by looking at the Winchester City Council website where you will find links and tips to help support your employment needs.

If you look under the section labelled 'Employment' you will find details of support programmes running. You can see the type of organisations we work with, to help support residents find work or develop skills.

Sometimes, these organisations can be referred to as 'employability organisations'.

Many of these organisations enable you to refer yourself for help, or you can get someone to refer you.

These organisations will talk to you to find out things like:

- What your skills and prior experience are
- What work you would like to be doing
- What your level of English is
- What your constraints you may have in terms of working hours
- If there are any other aspects that make it more challenging to find a job, such as a disability

Once they have this information, they can begin to advise you on suitable options .

## **Help to develop your English Language skills**

There are many different courses and tools to help you learn English and improve your skills. With in-person and online courses available and many free translation tools, you can find the best way to learn for you. You can add any English qualifications to your CV.

# English levels explained

The **Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR)** defines proficiency levels in terms of A1, A2, B1, B2, C1 and C2, each level getting progressively more proficient. Typically, in formal English classes offered to adult guests here, you'll be studying **English as a Second Language (ESOL)**, which is referenced in terms of Pre-Entry, Entry level 1, Entry level 2, Entry level 3, Level 1 and Level 2. These are mapped to each other as follows:

- Pre A1 = Pre-Entry
- A1 (Basic user) = Entry level 1
- A2 (Basic user) = Entry level 2
- B1 (Independent user) = Entry level 3
- B2 (Independent user) = Level 1
- C1 (Proficient user) = Level 2

At the British Council, you will be initially assessed on your current level of English and then placed in the appropriate class for your ability.



## Free online English classes for Ukrainian refugees

Some people may find it difficult to get to daytime English classes, especially if they are working.

- There are also some free and cheap courses being offered by the [British Council: Learn English Online | British Council](#). They also have an app called IELTS Prep which you can use to prepare for IELTS tests.

## English Language for Careers

If you need to develop the specific language skills required by various industries, then there are specific courses available. Some options are very costly, and it is worth contacting local **employability organisations** to see if they can assist or signpost you to support with course costs.

## Useful language translation tools

For online translation, translation tools such as Google Translate can be useful. DeepL translate has received good feedback as being close to native translations. [Duolingo](#) also may be useful for help with learning English.

# Frequently Asked Questions...

## Q. Are online job vacancy boards useful?

If you are using online job sites such as Indeed you can create a personal profile for specific job roles you are interested in and by location. You can also set up job alerts to let you know when new vacancies are posted that meet your requirements.

By creating an account and adding your CV, you can be ready to use the 'quick apply' application process as soon as you see a vacancy you are interested in.

## Q. Can I send my CV direct to an employer?

If you have done some research and identified a local employer, that is not part of large national business, then finding a local contact and sending them your CV directly can be a great way to get noticed.

If they are a large national employer with a head office based elsewhere in UK, then recruitment is usually managed via their own central career websites. Their vacancies aren't always posted on other online job vacancy sites, such as Indeed, so it is worth going to company web sites direct and look for job opportunities there.

## Q. How can I use LinkedIn to help me find work?

LinkedIn can help you build up a local community of like-minded professionals who work in your specific industry.

It can be helpful to find local employment opportunities which are posted on LinkedIn as well as enable you to network with other professionals who may have job vacancies in their organisation.

Many self-employed groups operate via LinkedIn and use the site to create a network of suppliers and partners who champion their business and work together to increase revenue. View this free guide on how to use [LinkedIn](#).

## Q. How can I improve my English whilst learning skills to return to work?

Creating opportunities to practice your English in a workplace setting will help to improve your English skills. There are many organisations who can support with English Language skills.

Volunteering is also a great way to build up your English proficiency whilst learning new skills for the workplace.
